Books & Reading

Required Summer Reading & Annotation Work:

Nácar: The White Deer — Elizabeth Borton de Treviño

This summer, students will not simply read but will begin practicing the habit of close reading and annotation. If you have any questions, please contact the School Office at 281-494-1157

For each two-page spread, do the following:

1. **Write a notes in the margins.** On each page, there should be notes about what is going on, and your thoughts about what is happening. Or, you might write a question that you would imagine asking someone else, like a quiz question.
2. **Write out the definitions of one word per TWO PAGE SPREAD that you previously have not encountered.** Make sure that the definition matches the word’s context in the book. If you already know all the words in the page, then pick a word that you think someone might not know but should. Do not pick weak words to avoid the difficult words. You don’t have to use the exact dictionary definition, just write briefly how you would explain the word to a smart 5th grader.

Example:

obnoxious — *adj* — annoying.

to **scamper** — *verb* — to crawl or run quickly in fear or excitement.

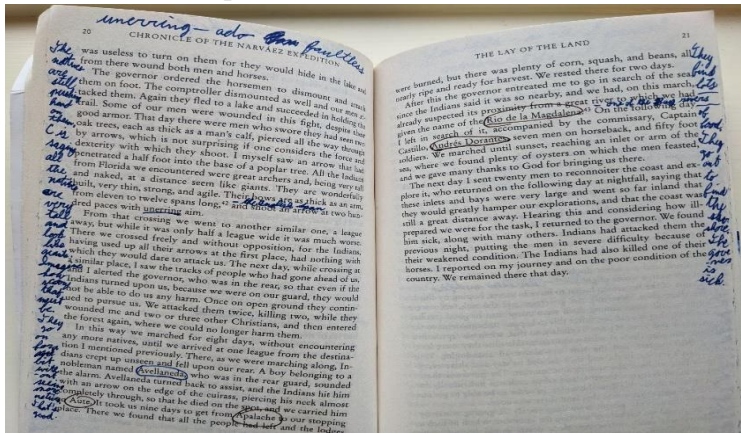
3. **Circle proper nouns that you don’t know.** So, for example, the first time you read about “Veracruz,” you circle the name, but after that you don’t have to. *See the example.*
4. **Reflection Paper (Required)**
 - Minimum 200 words
 - Written neatly (skip lines, best handwriting)
 - Due on the first day of school

Prompt:

The main character, Lalo, experiences difficulty in his life, yet this difficulty becomes a grace and blessing. In your response:

- Describe Lalo’s virtues
- Explain how he responds to challenges in a virtuous way
- Reflect on how you can grow in these same virtues in your own life

Here is an example of the annotation work. Notice three things:



- Notes in the margins.
- Definition along the top.
- Unfamiliar proper nouns are circled.

Math

- Review foundational math facts and problem-solving skills
- Strengthen fluency in operations and reasoning

Nature Studies

- Observe and study the natural world
- Reflect on patterns, order, and design in creation

Music

- Listen to sacred or classical music that encourages reflection

Activity: Write or reflect on how the music leads you to think about truth, beauty, and God

Art

- Practice drawing or sketching
- Create artwork inspired by your reading

Spiritual Life

- Attend **Holy Mass every Sunday** (even when traveling)
- Attend Holy Mass on some weekdays
- Pray the Rosary with your family every day. Even one decade is better than none!

Additional Ideas:

- Visit Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. He is waiting for you!
- Talk about God's creation during nature walks
